

Fund Update - reference index changes Invesco Global High Income Fund Invesco Global Technology Fund

4 July 2016

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- Investors Global High Income Fund invests primarily in high yield debt securities issued globally and debt securities from issuers in emerging market countries, which may be listed or traded elsewhere.
- Investors should note the risk with international investing, risk of investing in developing markets, concentration risk of investing in debt securities, investment risk, and risk relating to those share classes denominated/dealt in a different currency than the base currency of the Fund.

Reference index changes with effect from 31 July 2016

With effect from 31 July 2016, the reference indexes of the Invesco Global High Income Fund and Invesco Global Technology Fund ("the Funds") will have the following changes:

Reasons for the reference index changes:

The investment policy of Invesco Global High Income Fund allows for a flexible allocation to Emerging Markets (EM) and High Yield (HY) debt. The investment team have recently taken advantage of the flexibility and begun allocating closer to 80% to HY, which is where they expect to position the fund for the longer term. Given this change in allocation it was decided to amend the reference index to Barclays Global High Yield which itself has an 80% HY/20% EM allocation.

Invesco Global Technology Fund was benchmarked for relative Value at Risk and marketing purposes against MSCI World IT Index, which is 100% allocated to IT companies. The fund itself only has a 50% allocation with the majority of the remainder allocated to Healthcare and Consumer Discretionary. This allocation is more reflective of the Nasdaq Composite and after thorough analysis it was decided that the index should be changed to this one.

The above changes in reference index will not change the way the Funds are being managed nor will it result in any change to the risk profile of the Funds.
